We believe in the power of civil society and the unique ability of passionate pioneers to protect children and create positive change, even in times of crisis. If the past year has confirmed anything, it is this.

With Russia's large-scale invasion of Ukraine, the safety of children fell apart in an instant. Separations and traumas immediately put more children in vulnerable situations. The issue of child protection, not least the increased risk of sexual abuse, always needs to be at the forefront with a crisis such as war. This insight and knowledge already existed among our local partners. They had the drive and the tools - we gave them support and resources to continue and strengthen their work.

I am proud and in awe of how our local partners in Ukraine are protecting children in the midst of war. I am grateful for our strong network that immediately stepped up and generously helped us to quickly intensify our work in Ukraine and neighboring Poland and Moldova.

The fact that we were able to adapt so quickly is a result of our long-term relationships and persistent work for systemic change. We see this in Ukraine, where for almost two decades we have invested in local partners and projects with the potential to improve the situation of particularly vulnerable children.

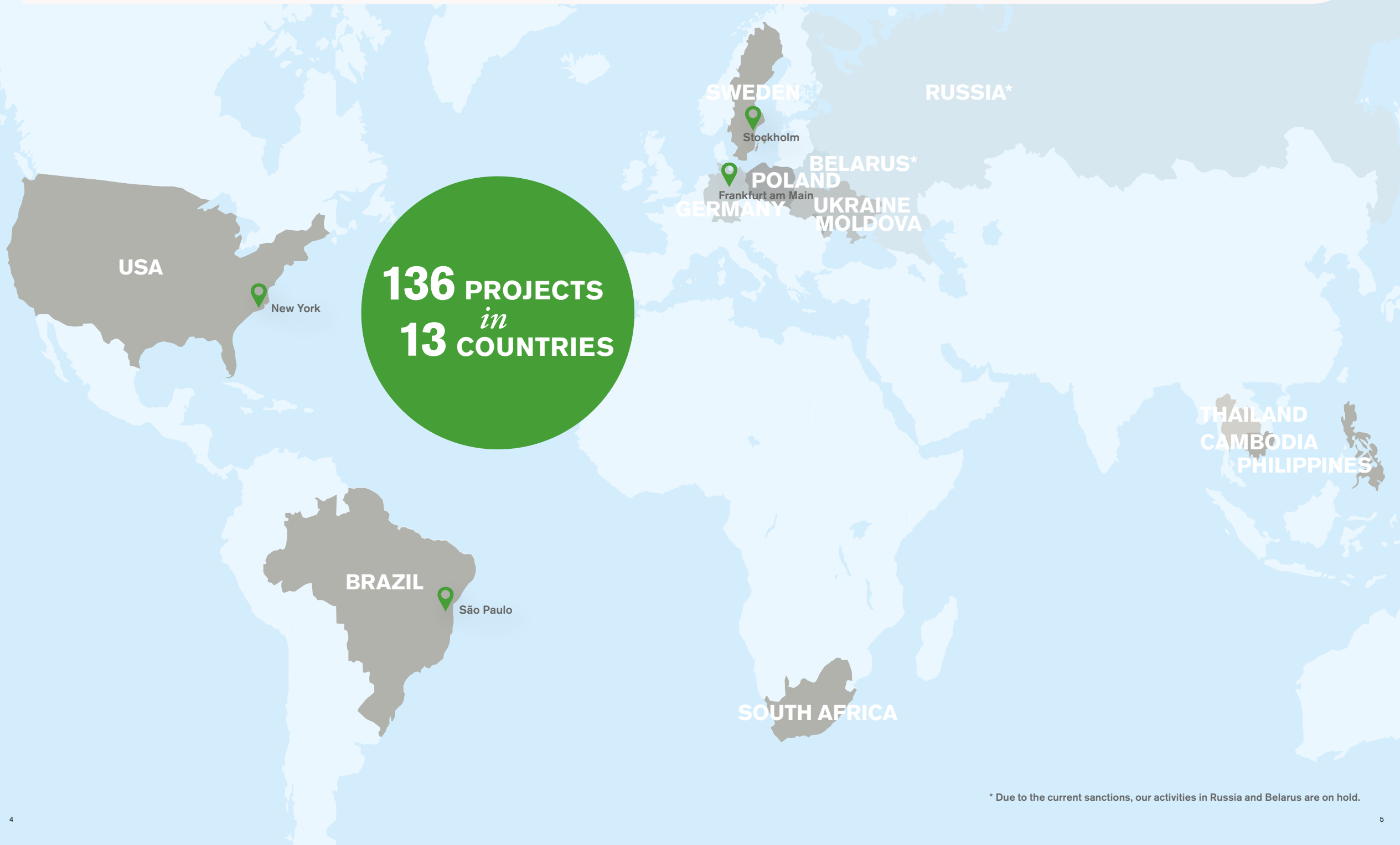

TOGETHER WE ARE PROTECTING CHILDREN AFFECTED BY THE WAR

Thank you to all the partners and donors who responded swiftly to Russia's large-scale invasion of Ukraine. We have been working in Ukraine for almost two decades and have built a wide network of local partners. Together, we have developed various interventions to strengthen the protection of particularly vulnerable groups. These include children in institutional care, children with disabilities and LGBTQ youth. In recent years, we have particularly focused on building up expertise on child sexual abuse. The need for this specific knowledge is more pressing than we could have imagined.

In the days following Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, we reached out to our partners in Ukraine, Moldova and Poland. They were there from day one for children and families in need of support. We quickly decided to provide additional emergency support to enable protection, evacuation and humanitarian action for particularly vulnerable groups. Throughout the year, we have collectively focused on seven complementary areas to strengthen child protection across the board:

1. Family strengthening interventions to prevent children from being separated from their parents.
2. Interventions for children separated from their parents.
3. Psychosocial support and trauma counseling for children.
4. Support for parents who have fled or remain in war-affected regions.
5. Technical solutions to identify children being abused and potential perpetrators.
6. Training and support for volunteers and professionals working with children.
7. Humanitarian and evacuation support for staff, vulnerable children and families.

Our crisis support was distributed among 12 partners in Ukraine, Moldova and Poland. This has resulted in:

- **Psychosocial support** and trauma treatment for around **600** children and parents in Ukraine. **Training** and support for over **100** people from **54** civil society organizations on how to protect children from sexual abuse. **NGO Resource Center**
- **Information campaign** reaching over **20,000** adults in Ukraine on how to strengthen child protection online. **International Leadership and Development Center**
- Training on risks and protection from sexual abuse for over **100** Ukrainian families with children with **disabilities**. **Healthy Society**
- Psychosocial support and protection for **LGBTQ youth** in Ukraine. **LGBT Association Liga**
- A **reception center** for **1,200** Roma children and adult Internally Displaced Persons (IDP) in Ukraine. **Blaho**
- Working with social authorities to establish **mobile services** for displaced children and families within Ukraine. **Hope and Homes for Children**
- Training **40 psychotherapists** in Poland on how to create safer and better relationships between children and parents who fled the war. **Empowering Children Foundation**
- Individual support and **trauma treatment** in Poland for over **800** children who fled the war. **Empowering Children Foundation**
- Ensured that **30 open pre-schools** in Poland with space for up to **400** children contribute to the integration and safety of children and mothers who have fled the war. **Comenius Foundation**
- Training in **psychological first aid** for **37** Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) staff working with displaced children and families in Moldova. **CCF Moldova**

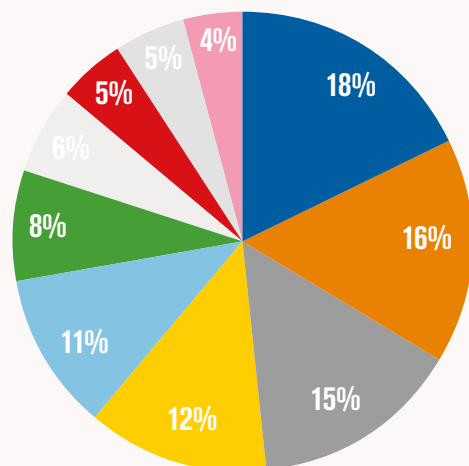

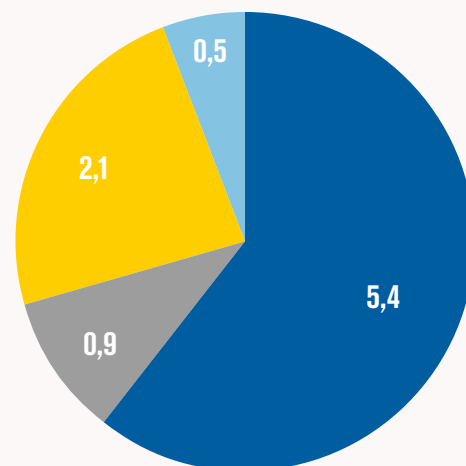

FOR EVERY CHILD’S RIGHT TO A SAFE CHILDHOOD

There are children and young people who are particularly vulnerable and at higher risk of sexual abuse. These include children without parental care, children in institutional care, children with disabilities, and children and young people who identify as LGBTQ. We strengthen the safety nets supporting these children by identifying gaps and investing in projects that can bridge them. We set up networks to promote long-term, positive change for all children by leveraging joint efforts and sharing knowledge.

EXPANDED FOCUS FOR SUCCESSFUL PREVENTION PROJECT

In 2006, Childhood Brazil initiated **On the Right Track** – a program that has successfully reduced the sexual exploitation of children and adolescents along Brazilian highways. More than a million truck drivers have been trained on how to make a difference to children facing abuse, and attitudes towards the sexual exploitation of young people have radically changed. In 2022, we continued developing the program for business trips as well. The aim is to provide employees, customers and business partners with knowledge on how to protect children and young people. The goal is clear: zero tolerance for the sexual exploitation of children and young people by business travellers.

ACTION PLAN FOR SYSTEMIC CHANGE

In Thailand, it is estimated that at least 100,000 children are being raised in orphanages. At least half of all orphanages are illegal and lack transparency.

Alternative Care Thailand (ACT) is a coalition of independent organizations that, with our support, have come together to push for change. Through extensive cooperation, training and contacts with the responsible authorities, we have contributed to the development and approval of a new action plan for a major reform of social care. The action plan now forms the basis for de-institutionalization, strengthened support for families in crisis and development of family-based placement alternatives.

90%

STRENGTHENED PROTECTION FOR CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES

Children with disabilities are particularly vulnerable and at high risk of sexual abuse. In Cambodia we have used a long-term strategy to highlight the risks and strengthen the child protection skills of several organizations working with these children:

- Kinship care for children who cannot live with their families. **Children in Families**
- Group housing and parental support initiatives. **Damnok Toek**
- Strengthening skills on protection from violence and abuse for children, both in civil society and among children's families. **Epic Arts**

- Training, mentoring and coaching to strengthen other stakeholders' skills and coordination. **Safe Haven**

460 children have received direct support in 2022. Chantha (below) is one of them.

CASE

“ Six-year-old Chantha was born without arms and abandoned by his parents when he was nine days old. He was then placed in our care home in Phnom Penh. Two years later, he was placed in one of our group homes. Here he has grown up in a family-like environment with safe adults. In 2018, we started the process of locating Chantha's family. His father is in prison and his mother works abroad. In early 2021, we made contact with his grandfather, but due to Covid-19 it took until December before we could bring them together. For several months, we visited Chantha's grandparents so that he could get to know them. Since October 2022, he has been living full-time with family members. We visit them regularly to make sure the integration is working. Chantha has developed strong bonds with his family and is safe. He goes to school and according to his teacher, he is the best student in the class!”

GATHERING FORCES FOR CHILDREN IN INSTITUTIONAL CARE

In 2022, we have continued our work to increase safety and reduce violence and abuse against children placed under **The National Board of Institutional Care (SiS)** in Sweden. We have gathered and coordinated a large group of stakeholders to work together to create long-term positive change for these children. We have disseminated knowledge that there are proven methods that do not use violence to meet children's needs in alternative care, including in direct collaboration with SiS. Together with the Swedish organization **Barnrättsbyrån**, we have continued to examine the situation of children in SiS through a study on sexual abuse of children in institutional care. The results will be presented in spring 2023.

“ It is easy to turn a blind eye to things in your proximity. Neglect and abuse of children in other countries is easier to be outraged by. Abuses in state-run compulsory care are normalized and the years go by. Childhood now brings together progressive actors who are willing and able to bring about real change for children in institutional care in Sweden. FOR A SAFE START IN LIFE

A key factor in preventing sexual abuse is the early identification of children who lack safe adults around them. With our investment in the Swedish project **BarnSäkert** (ChildSafe) project, we wanted to help ensure that psychosocial risk factors within the family are detected early and that parents receive the right kind of support. So far, about 100,000 parents and guardians have answered questions about, for example, substance abuse and mental illness in connection with routine checks at the Child health care center. The results, presented in autumn 2022, show that the method allows for more risk factors to be detected

in a greater number of families than expected. Thanks to the insight provided by BarnSäkert, the results also show that more parents voluntarily seek support from social services. Our goal is for the method to be made available in all regions of Sweden.

BarnSäkert has been carried out by Uppsala University and the Child Health Care Region of Dalarna, with support from us and our Swedish partner Barndom Utan Baksmälla.

CHILDREN IN ORPHANAGES

Strengthening families as an alternative to orphanages has always been a core issue for Childhood. Through our **Out of the ashes** project, we have strengthened this work in Thailand, Cambodia and Tanzania. Among other things, we have initiated two studies to deepen the knowledge of how children experience and are affected by being placed in orphanages. This is a collaborative project with Eriks Development Partner, funded by the Swedish Postcode Lottery. The project ends in 2023. Read more at www.barnhemskollen.se



More than 80 percent of children who grow up in orphanages have at least one parent alive. In 2022, we arranged a study trip to Kenya and Tanzania to show Swedish donors the current state of orphanages and what alternative options are available to ensure children's safety and the opportunity to grow up with their family.

TRAVELING OFFENDERS

In some countries, a combination of high levels of poverty, weak safety nets and popular tourist destinations make children particularly vulnerable. This is exploited by people who are traveling with the goal of sexually abusing children. With the **Say What You Saw** project, we have been addressing this widespread problem in the Philippines, Cambodia and Thailand. Among other things, we have contributed to strengthened safety nets for children, the establishment of the Childsafe Movement (training Childsafe agents) in several places, and training for travel industry and embassy staff. The project was run in collaboration with Ecpat Sweden, was funded by the Swedish Postcode Lottery and ended in December 2022. FOR THE EQUAL RIGHTS OF ALL CHILDREN

Children and young people who identify as LGBTQ may be at increased risk of sexual abuse due to discrimination, stigmatization and marginalization. For the same reason, they may find it more difficult to report sexual abuse. We focus on connecting our large network of children's rights organizations with LGBTQ organizations to strengthen the protection of children and young people through the exchange of expertise. We do this in Cambodia, Moldova, Poland, Sweden, Ukraine and the USA. Between 2021 and 2022, almost 26,000 young people contacted an online support line run by our partner **Liga** in Ukraine.

“ I did not know that children are exposed to violence and sexual abuse. This training has taught me how to identify early warning signs that a child is being sexually abused. I have also learned of ways that perpetrators deceive children and those around them. Before, I didn't believe that boys could be sexually abused – this is the first time I've learned about it. I have shared my knowledge of child protection with family members and friends. I have also learned how to respond to child sexual abuse if it happens at the drop-in center.”

PARENTAL SUPPORT FOR STRENGTHENED CHILD PROTECTION

An effective way to prevent children from being harmed at an early stage is through parental support programs. We have therefore worked to develop programs that reach out to the parents who need it most which has also included families fleeing Ukraine. The program is also now integrated into the national child protection program in Moldova. One example of this is Mellow Parenting, in collaboration with **Partnership for Every Child Moldova**, where we have put extra focus on including fathers.

TOGETHER FOR THE INVISIBLE CHILDREN

In collaboration with Swedish foundation **Regnbågsfonden** we organized a roundtable meeting in Stockholm in October 2021. The purpose was to get more people involved in the work of strengthening protection for boys and LGBTQ youth, two

groups that are rarely talked about in connection with sexual abuse. Exactly one year later, we organized a follow-up meeting to discuss what had been done during the past year and how to take the work further.

Our partner **M'Lop Tapang** in Cambodia provides a safe haven for children living on the streets or in vulnerable families. When the children heard about the war in Ukraine, they wanted to show their support for the war-affected children by sending them greetings through us.

A CHILDSAFE INTERNET

The internet enables innovative ways to reach out to children with support, knowledge and tips on what they can do to stay safe. At the same time, it is an environment where perpetrators are constantly finding new ways to reach and abuse children. Therefore, we also need to develop new ways to combat child sexual abuse. In 2022, together with leading researchers, technology developers and a strong network, we have been working to reduce risks and harness the potential of the internet to strengthen child protection.

A tool that finds child sexual abuse material online

The scale of child sexual abuse material circulating online is impossible to fathom. For a child victim, knowing that the abuse is being shared with others is an additional trauma. More must and can be done to prevent the spread of abuse material. This is why we are funding the development and deployment of **LIBRA** – a tool that

identifies and removes abuse material from the internet. In 2022, it was launched on a larger scale in Europe. In the first year alone, hundreds of thousands of child sexual abuse images and videos have been identified and removed.

Libra was developed by the Dutch company Web-IQ with financial support from us and the Dutch Ministry of Security and Justice.

PERPETRATOR PREVENTION: CHATBOT ON PORNHUB

We know that it takes different efforts to stop potential perpetrators. We also know that this changes over time. This is why we invest in unproven methods with potential, such as a chatbot developed by the UK's Internet Watch Foundation (IWF). The chatbot, which is activated when someone searches for child abuse material on **Pornhub**, was launched in 2022. In its first month of being tested only on Pornhub's UK website, the chatbot was activated

PREVENT IT

Ground-breaking and effective perpetrator prevention

Stopping potential perpetrators is crucial to preventing child sexual abuse. In 2017, we therefore chose to invest in **Prevent it**, a ground-breaking project where researchers at Karolinska Institutet (KI) developed an online Cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT) treatment in English for people looking at documented child sexual abuse. The participants were recruited via forums on the Darknet. During the project, we have worked closely with the team at KI to solve technical challenges, strengthen the child rights perspective and connect the project team with our international network and other funders. In December 2022, the results were published in the Official Journal of ISRII: Internet Interventions journal.

– The therapy we have developed is effective and significantly reduces the use of abusive material and other exploitative behavior against children, says Christoffer Rahm, chief consultant in Psychiatry and Head of Research for Prevent it. The results of Prevent it offers hope that it is possible to change the behavior of those at risk of committing child sexual abuse. The project has already set the stage for further interventions and research projects in the field of perpetrator prevention. In 2023, Prevent it will be scaled up and offered in Swedish, German and Portuguese in addition to English.

(AI) in the prevention of child sexual abuse. The interest in the project has been very high since the start and a number of different stakeholders from a wide range of industries have joined.

In 2022 we have :

- Launched a knowledge center.
- Reviewed Swedish grooming verdicts and released a report on these.
- Initiated several new collaborations to develop new tools, such as the development of clustering algorithms for analysis of a darknet forum and AI analysis of children's rights organizations' support chats. Stella Polaris is a four-year project funded by the Swedish Postcode Lottery.

SUPPORT FOR CHILDREN WITH SEXUAL RISK BEHAVIOR

An important part of our prevention work is the early identification of children and youth who are at risk of subjecting other children to sexual abuse. This is why we have invested in **WhatsOK**, the first platform in the US where children and youth who are concerned about their own, or others their age, sexually harmful interest and behavior can turn to. So far, 35,000 people have visited the site and over 200 have made direct contact for information and help. WhatsOk was developed by the organization **Stop it now!**

ONLINE ABUSE: THE RIGHT SUPPORT FOR 2,000 CHILDREN

Lack of knowledge about children's rights and online sexual abuse is a major problem, especially in low-income countries where internet access is increasing rapidly. In Thailand, in collaboration with **The Hug Project**, we have developed a handbook for people who meet children and young people in their work. 993 professionals have so far been trained on children's rights

and how to respond to children who have been abused online. More than 2,000 vulnerable children have received support from trained professionals. "We are seeing a clear increase in interest in cooperation from all professionals - law enforcement, prosecutors, social workers, NGOs – and even the victims of sexual abuse themselves, as they have all seen how good the outcome can be." **The Hug, Thailand.**

STELLA POLARIS

Strengthening child protection with AI

We need to be one step ahead of the perpetrators when it comes to utilizing the possibilities of the internet and new technologies. Therefore, in 2021 we started working to establish a cross-sectoral hub to accelerate the use of artificial intelligence

What contributed to you becoming a partner?

I really appreciate partnership manager Ellika Mårtensson's commitment and drive to develop our collaboration.

What has the collaboration meant for you in this first year?

A lot of positive things. It has been great to feel that we are contributing. That we directly and indirectly make a difference

for children through Childhood's important work. The children's handicrafts tent we ran at the Childhood Match Cup at Marstrand this summer was very fun. It's great to have an active partnership that enables different types of collaborations.

CHILD FOCUSED RESPONSE TO ABUSE

STRENGTHENED SUPPORT FOR ABUSED CHILDREN

48 PROJECTS
in 8 COUNTRIES

A child who has been sexually abused must receive the right support and treatment in a safe environment. This is something that we at Childhood have been working towards since the beginning. We work to ensure that the child's perspective is integrated at all levels of society – from the child's immediate environment to the healthcare and legal systems. We disseminate proven methods and models, invest in novel concepts and strengthen contacts between different stakeholders and social functions. In 2022, we saw several results of this work.

COMBINED SPECIALIST EXPERTISE FOR CHILDREN

Barnahus is a model for children who have suffered abuse. Here, children receive the right support and help from staff with expertise in child sexual abuse. We have worked for many years to establish the model in Sweden, Poland and Germany. In March 2022, with our multi-year support and work, **Partnership for Every Child** was able to open Moldova's first Children's House. The staff who have built up expertise on trauma and sexual abuse at the Children's Houses in Poland and Moldova have been an invaluable resource in the work with the children and families who have fled the war in Ukraine. With our support a similar model now also exists in Vitória da Conquista in Bahia, Brazil. In 2022, we developed guidelines to help more municipalities implement the model in line with the law on child-friendly support and treatment law adopted in 2017.

In Germany, Childhood has been the driving force behind the adoption of the model, which is now known as Childhood-Haus. In 2022, two new Childhood-Haus were opened. Another important achievement during the year was to secure public funding for all existing (8) Childhood-Haus. A further two are planned for 2023, with the aim of having one in every state (16).

FIELD-BUILDING COLLABORATION

Children who have been sexually exploited, for example through prostitution or sex as self-harm, often find it difficult to seek help and talk about their experiences. The ability to seek support anonymously online, and talk to someone who shares their experience, can reduce these difficulties. Existing helplines are often run by smaller organizations with limited resources. Most focus on a specific target group. We have therefore, together with the **Hugo Stenbeck Foundation**, initiated a collaboration between different helplines that offer chat, counseling and legal advice to children who have not yet received the right help.

Six organizations are currently included. The cooperation strengthens them individually, gives them a stronger voice and contributes to a coordinated field that can give more children the support they are entitled to.

“ The Stenbeck Foundation has started to invest more in field-building initiatives in recent years, where we support the development of an entire field rather than individual projects or organizations. This means a focus on creating relationships, building capacity and fostering real collaboration. An example of this approach is the Foundation's investment in the collaboration project. The Stenbeck Foundation strives to be courageous funders and Childhood is a natural partner in this regard.”

SAFE MEETING PLACE FOR YOUTH EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS

Homeless children and youth are particularly vulnerable to sexual abuse. In Harlem, New York, the **Safe Horizon** network, with our support, runs a drop-in center for children and youth who do not have a home to go to. In addition to basic resources such as food, clothing, showers, and rest, they receive legal and medical assistance, psychological support, and guidance on finding housing.



Most children do not dare to tell anyone about their sexual abuse. We work to ensure that all children who have been abused have the courage to speak out and that there are safe adults who listen, see and act.

The **Heroes Academy South Africa** is a program that educates and empowers boys in order to increase gender equality and prevent violence and sexual abuse. Participants say they have learned to treat themselves and others with respect and that violence is wrong. 98% of them say they can and want to be positive role models to make the world a better place.

ADVOCACY TOOLS THAT HIGHLIGHT SHORTCOMINGS IN CHILD PROTECTION

In 2022, we initiated, funded and launched the **US Pilot Out of the Shadows Index**, a study of how 12 states work to protect children from sexual abuse. The results show major shortcomings in all states. A common factor is that the systems in place lack a child perspective. It is also noteworthy that only two of the states (New York and Minnesota) have abolished all exceptions for child marriage for those under 18 and that only one state (Illinois) requires sex education in schools

to be evidence-based. The study highlights gaps and identifies what can and must be done. The results have attracted a lot of attention. In 2023, we will further map the situation in more states. The pilot study is based on the Global Out of the Shadows Index, an economic impact measurement of how 60 countries will make sure they reach target 16.2 of the Global Goals. The index was first launched in 2019, partly on the initiative of us at Childhood.

Through our projects in 2022, professionals and volunteers working with children have been trained in how to act if they suspect or discovers that a child has been sexually abused.

Increasing knowledge about risks, protection and rights is crucial in preventing child sexual abuse. Through our partners, we have reached nearly 8 million children and adults with information in 2022.

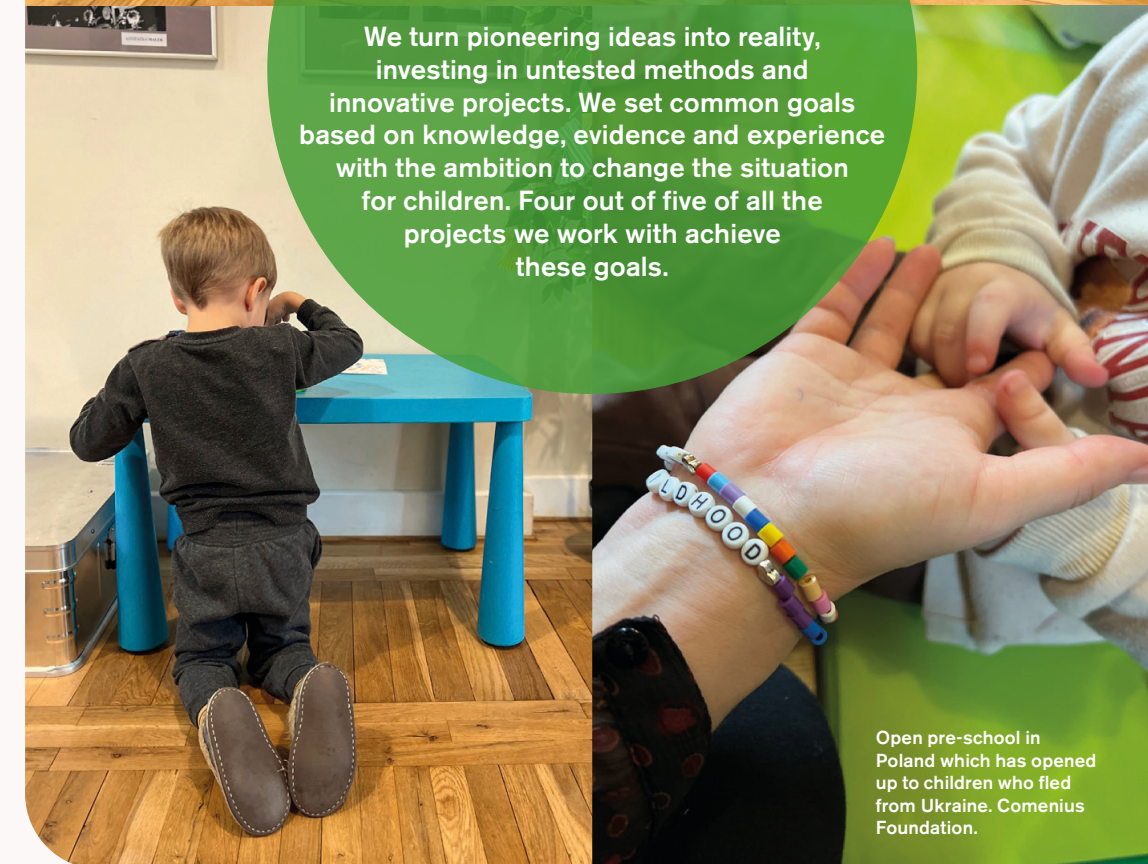
OUR THEORY OF CHANGE
